FACT SHEET

VIOLENCE AGAINST FIRE & EMS RESPONDERS

The Center for Firefighter Injury Research and Safety Trends (FIRST) at Drexel University has issued the following facts and solutions to address violence against fire and rescue service personnel.

FIRST REPORTS THAT:

- In 2022, there were 593 media stories covering 174 assaults against first responders.
- To date in 2023, there have been 346 media stories.

MORE FIRST CENTER FACTS:


- Between 57-93% of fire and EMS responders experience an act of verbal and/or physical violence at least once. Verbal violence is the most prevalent form.
- The range of physical violence ever experienced by fire and EMS responders is between 22.6-90% with patients being the most common perpetrator.
- In a study of nationally registered US EMTs, 8% of fatalities were due to assaults.
- Acts of violence experienced by fire and EMS responders are described as "struck by patient," "punched in the face by a drunkard," "tackled by a large man," and "assaulted by a combative patient".
- Paramedics have 14-fold higher odds for violent injuries than firefighter colleagues


